Message from the Board Chair:

Riverside County currently finds itself to be in a never before imagined time of great financial stress and great need for family support services. Child abuse reporting rates have significantly declined during the first months of this calendar year due to reports not coming from schools (which have been closed due to Covid concerns) but the severity of child abuse in the reported cases has been tragic and alarming.

The effective partnerships that the Child Abuse Prevention Council (HOPE Collaborative) had already developed with agencies such as First 5, Faith in Motion, SafeHouse and DPSS, etc. are now more important than ever and we move forward together to try to relieve these current and most threating of circumstances for the children of Riverside County. Our collective efforts have intensified and much time and focus has been spent on creating new methods of delivery for services to families. Outreach efforts are now most commonly delivered via the Internet and via social media platforms. In-person contact with families is almost non-existent and HOPE continues to try new and more creative ways of engaging families with offers of help and with links to services that they might need.

Perpetrators of child abuse and neglect are sadly, and most often, the very people responsible for the child's safety and well-being (including parents, other relatives, and babysitters). The best-known strategies from child welfare agencies across the whole United States for child abuse prevention remain the same from year to year and are most appropriate now in times like these when children are in their homes, not in school and not viewed by many outside of the home environment: To directly support families themselves and to provide parents with skills and resources that THEY need. HOPE and all of its collaborative partners throughout the Riverside County have used every means and every venue possible throughout this past year to strengthen, educate and assist the families of our communities and have now even increased the intensity of the collective efforts. HOPE goals are to assist families in every way possible during these most challenging times that a pandemic has brought to the county and to directly provide tangible help during these times of social isolation and lost employment.

HOPE submits this Annual Report for fiscal year 2019 -2020 to showcase some of the highlights of HOPE's collaborative partnership efforts throughout the past year. This Annual Report is submitted with sincere gratitude to the Dept. of Public Social Services (DPSS) for allowing the HOPE Collaborative to work under their informed oversight and for allowing HOPE to assist them in working to prevent child abuse and neglect throughout Riverside County.

Riverside County HOPE Collaborative members contribute to a shared Vision of a safe and secure environment for all children in Riverside County.





We were heavily involved in the "Blue Ribbons for Noah" Campaign last year which brought attention and hope to the hurting City of Corona, when one of their own young children was brutally murdered. Fast forward to the year 2020, which brought massive changes and challenges to not only District 2, but our entire nation. While we would not be hosting or attending any in-person outreaches, we "adjusted our sails" and got to work on building family engagement baskets.

We provided families with child abuse prevention information, games and snacks. Once again, we brought "HOPE" to a hurting community. When families were feeling isolated and forgotten, they were reminded that they weren't alone. It was an amazing experience to put a smile on the faces of children and families who quite frankly don't feel they have a lot to smile about after months of quarantine. There is so much work to do and I am honored to do my part to help families in our region.

District 1 Regional Collaborative

Area of Focus: Removing Barriers to the Education and Safety of At-Risk Youth and Families.

Members fulfilled their area of focus by sponsoring a program that serves the at-risk youth of Riverside Unified School District, Clean and Green is a program providing vocational training for Greenscape, custodial and soft skills.

District 1 hosted their 2nd Annual Winter Wonderland holiday event on December 13, 2019. They offered many of the amenities as their first year, including great food, arts and crafts activities and the Mobile Health Clinic. This year's event added a clothing closet for families to obtain free clothes. The event aimed to minimize holiday stressors by providing families with free resources and an opportunity to engage in some quality time with their children.

During the national pandemic, District 1 redirected attention to the families impacted. District 1 in collaboration with Service Providers created Family Engagement Baskets equipped with self-care essentials, non-perishable food items, and interactive family activities to reduce environmental stressors that could lead to abuse while sheltered in place.

District 2 Regional Collaborative

frea of Focus: Keeping Families Safe by ncreasing Preventative Resources and Outreach

District 2 sponsored "Protecting Our Youth," a series of educational workshops offered throughout the school year by Jurupa Valley Unified School District. Participants were able to acquire various tools and resources on the topics discussed.

Regardless of the many challenges brought on by COVID-19, District 2 was eager to provide families with the support neededthrough this time of isolation. Collaborative members provided them with Family Engagement Baskets in efforts to alleviate some stress and give families bonding activities while they were in quarantine.

Families were very appreciative to receive these baskets. Specifically, one family said this,

District 3 Regional Collaborative

Area of Focus: Parent Education and Relational Engagement.

District 3 Collaborative members worked together to strategize their efforts throughout the year. Early in the year they identified Anza as a city with high needs to target their efforts. Initially, collaborative members focused on hositng several resource events with an educational workshop for parents. Once the State Mandate to Shelter in Place occurred the resource events were cancelled, however collaborative members were determined to bring awareness of child abuse prevention to the families of their region.

In April, they brought awareness of Child Abuse by putting up blue ribbons at Tony Tobin Elementary School and Vail Ranch Middle School. Through this effort they encouraged the community to put up blue ribbons in their homes and around their community.

Collaborative members discussed the need to provide support to the families that were in quarantine and facing many family stressors. They put together tote bags with child abuse prevention brochures, Anti-Bullying coloring books, various children's books and promotional items. An additional effort to provide support to families was the distribution of Family Engagement baskets. The baskets had various items and activities to help alleviate the stress families were facing during the pandemic in an attempt to flatten the curve of potential child abuse being estimated throughout the nation and Riverside County.

Community Impact Highlights:

- Blue Ribbon Campaign offered pin wheels and Blue Ribbons for Vail Ranch Middle School and Tony Tobin Elementary School.
- 525 children's books for families of Temecula, Murrieta, Springs Charter, and Anza.
- 475 Tote bags for Temecula, Murrieta, Springs Charter, and Anza communities.
- 34 Family engagement baskets for Temecula, Murrieta, Springs Charter, SAFE Family Justice Centers and Anza.



District 3B Regional Collaborative

Area of Focus: Teen Exploitation Prevention and Intervention

Members fulfilled their area of focus by adjusting materials for outreach, specifically focusing on educational material designed for teens and pre-teens. They were able to partner with an online resource that provides educational material by teens, for teens. Special attention was placed on the importance of social media education and its associated dangers.

District 3B also discussed the importance of bringing awareness of Human Trafficking in their region and discussed having school staff receive a training to bring awareness of the issue that some children in their schools may face and what they could do to provide support.

On February 26, 2020, San Jacinto Unified School District held a Human Trafficking presentation by Opal Singleton for their school staff, about 50 individuals participated in this training. District 3B shifted focus in strengthening families that were directly impacted by COVID-19. Collaborative members identified over 60 families in their area that would benefit from extra assistance. They donated educational resources, boxes of diapers, wipes, and containers of formula to families directly affected by the pandemic.

- Formula, diapers, and wipes donated to over 60 families affected by the National Pandemic.




District 4 Regional Collaborative

Area of Focus: Increase Community Awareness of Child Abuse Prevention and Neglect. Gather and Provide Available Resources to Strengthen Families and Keep Children Safe.

District 4 fulfilled their area of focus by participating in events throughout the year. Specifically they provided support to the Flying Doctors event and the Day of the Child event. During the month of April, collaborative members focused on putting together a video which encouraged community members to report child abuse. This was important since some children could be isolated with their abusers during mandated stay home order. Indio Council member Waymond Fermon, was able to put together a video to encourage community members to report child abuse and shared via social media.

Collaborative members discussed the importance of getting child abuse prevention information out to families which were isolated and facing many stressors. District 4 collaborated with Desert Sands Unified School District, Palm Springs Unified School District and various agencies to hand out drawstring backpacks and tote bags containing Child Abuse Prevention brochures and educational material to empower the community to keep children safe. Additional items also included coloring books, parenting brochures and blue ribbons to spread awareness.



Community Impact Highlights:

- Sponsorship of children's books for Day of the Child on March 7, 2020 held in La Quinta, Cathedral City, and Coachella.

- 500 Drawstring Backpacks for Palm Springs Unified School District.

District 4B Regional Collaborative

Area of Focus: At-Risk Youth, Families and Community.

District 4B Collaborative focused on at-risk youth. They hosted a Human Trafficking presentation by Coachella Valley Sexual Assault on February 19, 2020 at the Twin Palms Continuation High School. This event provided students with information on Human Trafficking. Collaborative members set up tables to display available resources.

District 4B saw the need to provide families with support and decided to provide 20 baskets to the families in need. The baskets had various items and activities to encourage families to engage in and help eliviate some of the stressors they were facing during COVID-19. District 4B created a Resource Booklet to increase access and awareness of community resources.

Community Impact Highlights:

- Human Trafficking Presentation by Coachella Valley Sexual Assault on February 19, 2020 at the Twin Palms High School.
- 500 Resource Directories for families of John F. Kennedy Memorial Foundation, Head Start, Probation and Riverside University Health Systems Behavioral Health.
- 20 Family Engagement Baskets for Probation, Head Start, Riverside University Health Systems Behavioral Health and Wraparound.



District 5 Regional Collaborative

Focus Area: Closing the Gap on the Whole Family, Providing Resources to Prevent Child Abuse.

District 5 members were able to fulfill their area of focus through various activities throughout the year.

They sponsored the Annual Back to School event held by Community Health Systems Inc. on August 3, 2020 where backpacks filled with school supplies were distributed to each child in attendance. This event was well attended by the community, who received school supplies, food, and resources from various partners.

District 5 also discussed the need to focus on bullying was a current concern within the community and the collaborative felt the need to target this concern. They held an Anti-Bullying campaign on February 6, 2020 at Sunnymead Middle school. The campaign had a great turnout, students received educational material to bring awareness and a total of 204 Anti-Bullying pledges were signed by students.

The collaborative focused on providing Family Strengthening Baskets to families facing stressors during the pandemic. The baskets contained educational material focused on positive parenting tips, board games, nonperishable snacks and activities for parents and children to engage in while staying safe inside the comfort of their own home. Collaborative members were appreciative to receive these baskets for their families, one member said,

"All the families were truly grateful for the baskets, and have provided wonderful feedback about the children engaging in the activities...The families that received the baskets were identified due to having financial hardship, some struggling with parenting and bonding with their children, and overall due to the pandemic have experienced loss of employment ...Thank you!"

Community Impact Highlights:

- Sponsorship for the Community Health Systems Inc Back to School Event on August 3, 2019 in Moreno Valley. There was a total of 600 people at this event, with a focus on targeting low-income families surrounding D5 communities.
- Toys and Opportunity Drawings for Community Health Systems, Inc. event on December 7, 2019 in Moreno Valley, there was a total of 350 people in attendance, with a focus on targeting low-income families from D5 community.
- Sponsorship for Community Partners and Provider Conference-RUHS on November 7, 2019 reaching 83 individuals and targeting professionals and community organizations working with at-risk individuals surrounding D5 communities.
- Giveaway items for the Art Contest/Blue Ribbon contest held on social media through HOPE Collaborative on June 2020. Targeting families in the District 5 communities
- Family Strengthening baskets were distributed on June 2020, reaching 40 families in the communities of D5, targeting low-income families.



District 4 received two Certificate of Recognitions from Assembly member Eduardo Garcia for the collaboration of the Day of the Child events.

COVID-19 Family Support

This year, the entire world encountered an unexpected Pandemic caused by COVID-19 (Coronavirus). Families in Riverside County were no exception to the impact caused by COVID-19, and encountered loss of employment, financial hardships, raised anxiety, tension in relationships and parenting, and overall general fear.

The HOPE Board decided to show support to the families in most need, and made the recommendation to provide family engagement baskets and other much needed items, such as baby formula, diapers and wipes, to help relieve some of the stress.

With the collaboration between HOPE and our community partners, we were able to identify families and provided family engagement baskets, formula, baby wipes, diapers and child abuse prevention brochures to a total of 269 families.





District 5 was presented with a certificate of recognition from the Office of Senator Richard D. Roth for the collaboration in the Moreno Valley Family Health Center Annual Backpack Giveaway.

Mandated Reporter Training (MRT)

It is the goal of HOPE to provide education to individuals and professionals to heighten awareness and increase the reporting of child abuse and neglect. By educating what is reportable, it is expected that necessary reports will be made and intervention for children in need will occur. First time and refresher trainings are provided in English and Spanish. Examples given throughout training are tailored to match the needs and specific professions in the audience (e.g., mental health, law enforcement, parents, child-development teachers, etc.). This year, HOPE staff facilitated a total of 18 Mandated Reporter Trainings and reached a total of 472 individuals. This year, unfortunately because of the COVID-19 pandemic, some in person MRTs were cancelled. As of May 2020, MRTs resumed via facilitation through Zoom.

Community Events

Community engagement is a key component of the HOPE Collaborative. Staff have the opportunity to directly speak with families and share information on child abuse and related topics. This year, a total of 30 community events were attended, reaching 1,857 individuals.

In partnership with the Department of Public Social Services, Family Resource Centers (FRC), HOPE facilitated a mental health focused workshop and resource fair at the Rubidoux FRC. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, scheduled workshops had to be cancelled at the other four FRCs.

Public Awareness

Public awareness is a key component to child abuse prevention. HOPE staff attends outreach events where preventative materials and information are provided, maintain a website with resources and information, utilize social media, and provide trainings and workshops on various child abuse prevention topics. This year, due to COVID-19 social distancing state mandates, HOPE focused heavily on reaching families via the use of media efforts.

Blue Ribbon Contest

In the beginning of April, HOPE encouraged community grassroot outreach through various efforts, including the blue-ribbon contest. The contest consisted of tying blue ribbons in their home, school, organization, etc., and/or wearing the color blue to show support to the cause; sharing photos of the efforts via the use of designated hashtags. #BlueforPrevention #BlueAgainstAbuse





Art Contest

The art contest which was also held in the month of April. It was a great way for aspiring artists in our community to use their talent to speak on the importance of stopping child abuse, for creative children to express their thoughts and creativity, and for parents to have the conversation with children about what child abuse is and why it is important to stop it from happening.

Media

Media efforts were utilized throughout the year to share information on events, education on child abuse prevention, contests, resources

and services available in Riverside County, and photos of HOPE's "Wow" moments. Media outlets used by HOPE this year include: Instagram, Twitter, Facebook, Youtube, and the HOPEcollaborative.org website.



Billboard

As stay at home mandates became a reality for children and families, a significant decrease in calls to the child abuse hotline emerged. With children isolated from school and peers, it was important to remind the community to look out for each other and to report any suspected abuse. In efforts to share the child abuse hotline across Riverside County, billboards were strategically place along busy highways within each supervisorial district. An estimated 15,007,088 impressions resulted from this awareness effort.

HOPE for the Holidays

HOPE had another successful year of its annual HOPE for the Holidays Toy Drive. HOPE for the Holidays is a special project in which HOPE coordinates with Riverside County Department of Social Services to spread cheer to identified foster youth by reducing holiday stressors with a gift. A total of 712 foster youth received a gift. This project was possible due to the generosity of the County Supervisors awards of County Improvement Designation (CID) Funds, My Stuff Bags Foundation, and donations from other organizations and community members. A total of \$42,961.84 value was raised for the toy drive.

County Children's Trust Fund

In 1983, the state legislature passed assembly bill 2994 which established the County Children's Trust Fund (CCTF). The purpose of the CCTF is to support Child Abuse Prevention Councils (CAPCs), along with intervention programs operated by private nonprofit organizations or public institutions of higher education, with recognized expertise in fields related to child welfare. Since 2013, Family Service Association has received funding from the CCTF for HOPE Collaborative, the Child Abuse Prevention Council for Riverside County. In FY 19/20, the CCTF funded the CAPC HOPE Collaborative with a total of \$568,037.00.

Contract Outcomes and Targets

[W & IC 18982.] A child abuse prevention coordinating council is a community council whose primary purpose is to coordinate the community's efforts to prevent and respond to child abuse. The HOPE Collaborative's mission encompasses the requirement of this section of the California Department of Social Services Welfare Institutions Code (W & IC). The coordinated effort of the countywide HOPE Board and regional collaborative councils ensures that countywide efforts are flexible, responsive to the community need aligned with the CAPC (Child Abuse Prevention Council) goals. The HOPE Collaborative will focus on four key approaches in the prevention of child abuse: Community Connections, Public Awareness, Trainings, and Capacity Building. Efforts made under these four approaches will allow for meeting CAPC W & IC requirements, contract targets, and will support the Riverside County Department of Social Services (DPSS) system improvement plan.

Community Connections

- Participate in Riverside County's Self-assessment (as applicable)
- Maintain and coordinate seven regional collaborative councils
- Hold bi-monthly multidisciplinary team meetings (HOPE Board meetings)
- Assist with the Community Partners
- Forum Network with providers in the community to facilitate/coordinate ongoing family strengthening services, based on community needs, at the FamilyResource centers Map and strengthen a comprehensive, accessible, unified network of sustainable family-support organizations expanding collaborative participation by 10%, advancing innovative partnerships that increase and influence prevention funds.

Public Awareness

- Maintain and upkeep the HOPE
 Collaborative/ Riverside County CAPC
 website, that provides information
 to the public, Board of Supervisors
 and DPSS HOPE will complete an annual
 report, which highlights all efforts
 and achievements throughout the year
- Participate in a minimum of at least three community events in each Supervisorial District, to distribute materials related to the prevention of child maltreatment (materials will be culturally and

language appropriate)

- Maintain HOPE Collaborative social media accounts (e.g., Twitter, Instagram, and Facebook) where information related to the prevention of child abuse and neglect is shared
- Coordinate a minimum of one resource fair at each of the five Riverside County Family Resource Centers.

Trainings

 Facilitate a minimum of 24 Mandated Reporter Trainings.

Capacity Building

- Maintain a broad base of volunteers
- Utilize grant writing, fundraising, and other revenue-generating strategies to provide additional strategic initiatives (in addition to contracted requirements)
- · Obtain and coordinate in-kind goods.
